

- Adopted a resolution to condemn white supremacy, calling all ELCA congregations to engage in a "study of the structures and rhetoric that

empower and fuel racism and white supremacy and to take to heart the teaching of Scriptures, so we may all be better equipped to speak boldly about the equal dignity of all persons in the eyes of God."

- Adopted a memorial to encourage all synods and congregations to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the ELCA's ordination of women in 2020.
- Adopted a memorial that affirms the ELCA's longstanding commitment to migrants and refugees and declares the ELCA a sanctuary church body.

It is important that we understand that any statement, resolution, or memorial is always under our Savior Jesus Christ. It is a time now to read, digest, discuss, and dialog about this information as a

St. John's Choir performed the cantata *The Christmas Light*, a musical piece consisting of well-known classical melodies and hymns that walked through Advent and the birth of Christ.

Parish Life Ministry Team continues to experience the blessing of seeing members step out in faith using the gifts God has given them. A number of our BeFrienders speak about using the skills and training they received in BeFriender ministry to care for family members, neighbors, friends, and acquaintances.

In 2019 St. John's member and BeFriender, Kathy Crabtree, began hosting a monthly gathering for widows. While not specifically a St. John's ministry, there are several St. John's ladies attending. The group meets monthly for lunch and conversation. Kathy is ministering in a wonderful way to those who are experiencing the unique journey of widowhood.

FELLOWSHIP AND MEALS

The Parish Life Ministry team continued to assist with events throughout the year involving meals and hospitality.

Faithful volunteers assisted with the following:

- Sunday morning coffee fellowship (26 volunteers)
- A home-cooked meal offered to families with new babies (26 volunteers)
- Funeral meals provided for seven families (101 volunteers)
- The annual Easter Continental breakfast and Swedish Heritage service provided wonderful opportunities for fellowship and celebrating the rich heritage of St. John's.
- ONE Worship Service in August was a wonderful day as the congregation worshiped outside under a tent and then enjoyed a boxed lunch on the grounds.
- Kaffehuset and Lunch Bunch continue to provide opportunities for learning and meaningful fellowship.

HEALTH AND WELLNESS

Health and Wellness Event and Flu Clinic

This year's Parish Life Health and Wellness event focused on flu prevention, maintaining healthy blood pressure, and BeFriender Ministry. Seventy individuals were protected from influenza—26 were over the age of 65 and 44 were under. Blood pressure screenings also were offered. BeFriender Ministry highlighted the importance of having caring listeners available when life is challenging. Thank you to St. John's members Melanie Beedle and Don McAuley for their assistance in planning this event.

Yoga

Yoga is offered Saturday mornings at 11 AM and seasonally Wednesday evenings at 6 PM. Thank you to St. John's member Janice Neuleib for faithfully leading these classes.



WOMEN'S MINISTRY

Highlights from 2019 include:

- Abigail and Rebekah Bible studies continue to meet monthly, September through May.
- Two book clubs meet monthly.
- Aspire Women's Event—11
 women traveled to Peoria for
 a night of music, comedy, and
 inspirational teaching on the
 book of Romans.
- Simply Still Women's Christmas event—Offered for the second year, this event provides the opportunity to slow down, breathe deeply, and truly reflect the beauty of Advent. This year's program focused on the promises of Advent.
- Prayer Shawl Ministry— In 2019 the prayer shawl members made 47 prayer shawls, 435 prayers squares, and 25 caps. Prayer shawls, prayer squares, and/or caps were given to St. John's high school graduates, Community Cancer Center, Advocate BroMenn Mission and Spiritual Care Department, and

members of St. John's. Pink prayer squares were made for the Pray for the Cure event held at St. John's in September, and blue prayer squares were donated for the Simply Still and Blue Christmas events in December. Those attending Blue Christmas also had the opportunity to take a prayer shawl. We are looking at small ways to expand this ministry in 2020.

PRAYER

Prayer Chain and Weekly Prayer Gathering

Several new members were added to St. John's Prayer Chain in 2019. A team of 36 prayer warriors lift up hundreds of prayer requests throughout the year.

The Thursday prayer gathering remains small but faithful. It is truly a privilege to pray for those who are ill, hospitalized, grieving, or celebrating a milestone.

CHRISTIAN CARE

BeFriender Ministry

BeFriender Ministry continues to thrive with 29 individuals actively serving. In addition to one-on-one assignments, BeFrienders assist with hospital and home communion visits. BeFrienders participate in monthly meetings to reflect on their caring relationships and also take part in continuing education. Two helpful topics this year were ministering to those caring for a loved one with Alzeheimer's disease and having difficult conversations with empathy. It was a bittersweet year for the BeFriender Ministry team. We were excited to have Pastor Anne Christiansen officially installed as Associate Pastor for Member Care. At the same time we came together to celebrate the ministry of BeFriender leader Paul Crownhart as he and his wife Fran prepared to move out of state.

99 Plus One Ministry to Inactive Members

This ministry continues to emphasize the importance of worship and connection to St. John's through a three-step process. Members who have been absent from worship in the previous three months receive a postcard along with a handwritten note inviting them to return to worship, along with information about upcoming events at St. John's.

Once a member has been absent from worship for four months, an e-mail/letter from St. John's pastors is sent with a short survey. Inactive members are able to provide feedback including whether they have just forgotten to sign the attendance pad when attending worship, have moved away, are attending another church, would like to be removed from St. John's membership, and/or have a letter of transfer sent.

At the six-month mark, inactive members receive a phone call from a member of the 99 Plus volunteer team. The goal of this phone call is to reinforce St. John's sincere desire to care for its members.

Inactive members who do not respond to the invitation postcard, survey, or phone call are placed in one-year inactive status. Once members have been inactive for two years, their membership is submitted for Council action.

In 2019:

- 270 postcards were sent
- 204 surveys were sent
- 355 individuals were referred to calling team
- 139 members returned to worship or provided feedback

Caregivers Ministry

A team of five faithful ladies sent hundreds of cards to St. John's members in 2019. Individuals celebrating milestone birthdays and anniversaries, weddings, baptisms, and those who are ill or have lost a loved one receive the tangible expression of God's love through this ministry.

Splash Cradle Roll

At Pastor Anne's suggestion, we have formed a cradle roll to support families with young children. The *Splash* curriculum is focused on faith formation for children, birth to age three. Each month families receive a newsletter which includes a parent page with helpful parenting tips and ideas, a Bible story, prayer, and worship suggestions. Our hope is that these materials will be helpful for parents in raising their children in a Christian home.



SHELBY NEXT DATABASE CONVERSION

In September, St. John's converted our membership database from Shelby version 5 to Shelby Next. This involved a number of weeks of cleaning up existing records and archiving old records so that the conversion would go smoothly and accurately reflect current members and guests. There are a number of features in Shelby Next that will be helpful to the staff as we coordinate the many ministries of St. John's. One of the helpful features of Shelby Next is that it allows congregation members to access and update their membership profile and giving records.

GRIEF AND LOSS

Journeying Through Grief

The Stephen Ministry series Journeying Through Grief was sent to 31 individuals in 2019. Scheduled to be sent at intervals of three weeks, three months, six months, and 11 months following the loss, these materials are impactful for the unique experience of grief individuals experience.

Blue Christmas Service

This quiet, reflective service has become an annual worship opportunity for those who find Christmas to be a painful time. Through prayers, scripture, and music which acknowledge God's presence, God's Word comes to shine light into the darkness. BeFrienders assist with the service and provide a listening presence.



ADULT EDUCATION MINISTRIES

Adult education has continued during 2019. Regular classes are offered as a means for members to grow in their faith. Pastor David offered a pastor-led study on Thursday morning. Ann Stemm continues to coordinate Kaffehuset on Wednesday mornings.

Small group learning continues to grow, with two additional groups of couples that started this year. Many use the resources of *RightNow Media* or look for studies to align with St. John's transition in 2019 to the Narrative Lectionary.

The Friday morning men's Bible study, Monday evening women's group, and Abigail and Rebekah women's groups have continued to meet regularly throughout 2019. The Wednesday evening men's group meets on the first and third Wednesdays of the month and has incorporated service and fellowship events into their curriculum.

Financial Peace University classes were offered in the Spring, incorporating both members and non-members into the classes. In collaboration with the St. John's Endowment Fund, a new course was offered in the fall on the theme of *Leaving a Financial Legacy*.

Brainstorming has begun for 2020 as transitions to our facility become a reality. This dialogue will involve many staff, the Council, and lay leaders to offer input.

NOAH'S ARK PRESCHOOL

For more than 40 years, Noah's Ark teachers and staff have been inspiring learning for children and families. The preschool currently serves 125 children and their families. While attending Noah's Ark, children learn readiness and social skills needed to prepare them for their school journey.

This year we began a partnership with the Illinois Wesleyan School of Language for Kids offering French and Spanish to our four- and five-year-old classes. Along with the use of our research-based Creative Curriculum, each month the children learn a Bible story presented to them in the Sanctuary by a pastor or staff member in order to become familiar with the Bible and God's Word. Although some Noah's Ark families attend St. John's, there are many who do not, but being in the Noah's Ark family provides an opportunity for parents to learn about programs and events held at the church by receiving fliers and social media updates. Noah's Ark families are a diverse group, attracting families from many different cultures. During their time at Noah's Ark, families build supportive relationships that are kept for years to come.

During 2019 the preschool participated in several service projects to help others in the community. In February canned goods and paper supplies were collected for the Neville House, and in April children and families raised funds for St. Jude through a Trike-a-thon. In October socks for Home Sweet Home Mission were collected and in November we joined the church in collecting empty detergent bottles for Midwest Food Bank.

It is a blessing to be located in the St. John's church building and have so many resources available.

On May 1, Noah's Ark became water-soaked because of a drain back up in all of the three-year-old classrooms. It was determined that we would not be able to finish the rest of the year in our space. With the help of our teachers and St. John's staff, we were able to relocate to the nursery area for the remainder of the school year. Noah's Ark staff and church staff spent countless hours over the summer putting the school and playground back together. We now have an even more beautiful facility after the renovation. I would like to invite everyone to stop by and visit, and when you are in the community, please recommend Noah's Ark Preschool to your family and friends. Registration for the 2020/21 school year begins January 25.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES

This year was a year of changes, and with it came some wonderful opportunities for learning, service, and worship for the youngest members of our congregation!

I became the full-time Director of Children's Ministries at the end of January 2019, replacing Interim Director, Andrea Canales. It was a successful year despite the transitions, and thanks to the many involved parents, volunteers, and supportive congregation members, the usual programs continued to grow abundantly. Each week in Joy Zone, children heard the Word of God through small group Bible stories and activities and large group skits, music, and worship elements.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE YEAR

April

Holy Communion Milestone—A two-day learning program involving children and parents where they learn about the significance of Passover and the meaning of Holy Communion in the Lutheran church.

June

Vacation Bible School—A week-long program that teaches children, three years of age through 5th grade, about Jesus through hands-on experiences, activities, music, and Bible stories. This year the theme was *ROAR—Life is Wild, God is Good!* There were more than 150 volunteers involved and 250 children who participated.

August

Backpack Blessing—Children and educators heading back to school brought their backpacks to church for a special blessing over the new school year.

September

Joy Zone Kickoff—a new year of Joy Zone began with the introduction of the *Narrative Lectionary* curriculum. New elements of the program included large-group worship for all ages and service project opportunities during small group time.

My Bible Stepping Stone—Children entering Kindergarten and 3rd grade received new Bibles. Parents gave their children the new Bibles during worship and Pastor David blessed the families and thier Bibles. A learning event also accompanied the Bible blessing where parents and children learned about the important features of their new Bibles and ways they can make Bible study a routine part of home life.

December

Children's Christmas Experience—God Kept His Promise was a Saturday morning event for toddlers through early elementary-aged children and their families. Activities included crafts, Nativity dress-up, and dramatic play, a winter photo booth, and a children's sermon by Pastors David and Anne, telling the story of Jesus' birth and the importance of God's promises of Advent during the season.



Coming on board as the newest staff member at St. John's, it has been a fantastic experience discovering and learning the church's history and culture, while also planning, preparing, and most importantly, praying for God's path ahead in year of 2020!

I have heard it said to me a few times that I had big shoes to fill as Mr. Rob had built up a wonderful Junior High program. I am so grateful for the opportunity to fill this exciting role in Junior High Ministries, guiding the youth on their faith journeys as they engage, equip, and embrace our Lord Jesus Christ.

Prior to my arrival in August, the 6th-8th grade youth enjoyed a Spring Retreat on March 15-17 at Lutheran Outdoor Ministries Center (LOMC), in Oregon, Illinois. On June 16-21, nine Junior High students had a wonderful opportunity to connect with Pastor David at Faith Works Camp at LOMC.

The Wednesday evening Thrive program continues to meet regularly with 54 students registered and 15 Guides. Each week youth engage in God's Word following the *Narrative Lectionary*, relationship building, and faith sharing with their small groups and in large-group learning formations. Students have participated in several mission projects—assembling school supply kits for Lutheran World Relief, creating gift tags for the Giving Tree, building tabletop crosses for ministry projects, and completing special take-home gifts for Christmas Eve worship.

The fall was busy with a exciting opportunities. The youth partnered with Senior High ministries to offer a night of games and unique fellowship for families at the Trunk-or-Treat event held on October 30. The event hosted a total of 300 people (140 children). Flannel Fest took place on November 3 at East Bay Camp with a total of 15 youth and eight adult participants. The group enjoyed an evening of games and campfire activities.

In looking back and stepping into the New Year, Junior High Ministries will continue to align with the overall St. John's ministry vision of reaching children, students, and adults with the biblical, spiritual, and baptismal promises allowing us to Thrive in life as God's beloved children!

DINNERTIME

Dinner Time is kid-friendly, balanced meals that are served family-style. The fall semester had 70 people registered with the option of paying for a semester at a discounted price. Drop-in guests are welcome at a cost of \$5 per person, payable that evening. We have had up to 20 people drop in for dinner! There is always plenty of food! The senior high youth continue to be very active in numerous ministry events that live into our Church's mission statement to engage and equip people to embrace Jesus Christ.

STUDY

Ignite Small Groups meet twice monthly and CHAOS large group meets on Wednesday nights all year. Both ministries are biblically-based study groups which benefit from adult leaders and peers in their walks of faith.

WORSHIP/PRAYER

Youth helped lead worship ministries throughout the year through involvement as ushers, musicians, and singers. They also lead worship on the third Sunday of the month at the 11 AM service. They have come together in shared prayer in Ignite small groups and CHAOS and hosted the Prayer Room during Holy Week.

SERVICE

Senior high youth regularly serve through St. John's missions partners Midwest Food Bank and Home Sweet Home Mission. Special events include Homeless Night for Habitat for Humanity, Jesus Gloves You for the street homeless of Chicago, blanket making for the homeless and elderly of our community, and Polar Plunge for Special Olympics. Youth also serve as Joy Zone and Vacation Bible School leaders.

Senior high youth traveled to the impoverished community of Worthington, Minnesota, for the summer's Work Camp missions trip. At Worthington, the Work Camp group from St. John's ministered to a community that has been aging for many years. The homes were in need of beautifying and repair. As the community has aged significantly we worked with seniors, disabled, and some impoverished families. Our youth helped renovate and clean up more than 50 homes, but they also encouraged a community that needed to know that they were not forgotten. Our youth were leaders of service, compassion, and worship at the high school during devotion and worship.

COMMUNITY

The Senior High youth gather together to form community on a regular basis for special events such as lock-ins, camping overnights, bonfires, and parties. They also form small communities through their small groups and their regular attendance to weekly ministries such as CHAOS and Joy Zone.

GUEST EXPERIENCE AND CONNECTIONS

At the heart of the Guest Experience and Connections Ministry team is our core value to welcome all people and to help people feel connected as part of the church family. We've had a great year of welcoming new people and seeing people make connections. It's exciting to see our newest members and guests not only show interest, but also get engaged in service, fellowship, and learning opportunities.

CONNECTIONS

Our connections process for new members has been evolving in the last few years. The current new member connections process is:

- St. John's 101 Class—one-hour class offered on the first Wednesday of most months. We focus on the mission, vision, and values of the church, an overview of Lutheran theology, and the connections process. This class is designed for new guests who are curious about the church, as well as those interested in membership.
- St. John's 201 Class—one-hour class offered on the third Wednesday of most months. The main focus of this class is the ministries of the church and how to get connected through service, learning, or fellowship. This class is designed for those interested in membership. We started this class during 2019 and separated it from the content in the 101 class so that those who were still exploring church options could attend 101 without the pressure of membership. Previously the content of St. John's 101 and 201 was covered in the same class for a longer amount of time.
- PLACE assessment tool—The PLACE assessment tool is a five-part tool designed to highlight how God has uniquely created individuals for life and ministry. The five sections include Personality, Spiritual Gifts, Abilities, Passion, and Life Experiences. We ask all new members to complete this assessment sometime during the connections process.
- Coaching—After individuals complete the PLACE assessment, they
 have the opportunity to meet with a PLACE Connections Coach.
 The purpose of a coaching session is to provide a one-on-one
 opportunity to discuss the results of the assessment and explore
 possible ministry involvement.
- Shepherding—Every new member has the option of being paired with a Shepherd. Shepherds are a relational team of people focused on serving as a resource and connector to those in their first year of membership.
- Next Steps: Find Your PLACE—We continue to offer Next Steps three times a year as our Connections event and follow-up to the St. John's 101 and 201 classes. Next Steps consists of a two-hour



event with lunch and a program to allow new members to meet other new members, Shepherds, and staff; learn about ministries of St. John's; and explore personal ministry involvement.

• New Member Reception—We continue to welcome new members three times a year, typically the month following the Next Steps event, which occurs in the spring, summer, and fall.

STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

One of our strategic priorities is to be a Bible-literate congregation by delving deeper into the Word. One way we have lived out this priority this year is by adding three new small groups, including a women's group of all ages, a 30-40s couples group, and a 50-plus couples group. One other strategic priority we focused on specifically during December was to invite without ceasing and welcome with open arms. We offered hospitality through serving hot chocolate and cookies at the Christmas at the Mansion event at Ewing in early December. We passed out invitation cards and invited everyone we met to attend one of our Christmas Eve services. It was wonderful to see so many volunteers, including several new members, joyfully inviting people to St. John's!

GROWTH AND NEW EVENT

This year we had an increase in the number of people who attended St. John's 101, an increase in the number of guests at Next Steps, and new volunteers on the Guest Services team. In addition to this growth, we are also in the planning stages for a new event in 2020 which is aimed at our newest members and guests as a follow-up to Next Steps. The purpose of this Connections Celebration is to provide a fun fellowship opportunity, celebrating new members, and inviting them into a fellowship or learning group if they aren't already feeling connected to the church family.

- Number of people attending St. John's 101—58 (average of four to five people per month)
- Number of people attending Next Steps—58 guests total for the three events
- Number of people who attended Next Steps who were engaged in some type of ministry in 2019—33 of 58

- Number of Guest Services volunteers for special services—75-100
- Number of pre-existing small groups in 2019—6
- Number of new small groups since summer of 2019—3

VISION 2020

In 2019 the Vision 2020 Facility Project Team focused on gathering input from congregation members, meeting with BLDD Architects, and facilitating the Financial Feasibility Study completed by The James Company.

On May 1, more than 200 members gathered to learn more about the Vision 2020 project and give input on two possible scenarios to meet our facility needs for the future. Participants were

asked to envision how an updated and expanded facility could: enhance the worship experience and improve gathering areas, expand education opportunities, and identify ways we could better serve our community and beyond.

In July, John Clark of the James Company conducted a Financial Feasibility Study receiving more than 150 survey responses and personally interviewing more than 50 St. John's members.

Results of this study:

- offered communication recommendations
- highlighted that congregation members appear split on replacing or enhancing the current Sanctuary, but all agree something must be done
- provided insight into the budget and possible campaign giving results

The Vision 2020 team reviewed the information received from both of these activities and determined the following:

- 1. We remain committed to the following priorities:
- Enhanced worship experience through one worship space that will accommodate 500 people and all types of worship styles.
- Larger, inviting gathering areas for fellowship and learning.

- Improved efficiency and security for the office area with easier wayfinding for members and guests.
- 2. The budget was reduced from the initial \$10-\$12 million to \$7 million, based on the Feasibility Study results for capital campaign giving and additional financing options available.

At year-end the Vision 2020 team continued to meet with BLDD Architects to develop a project that can accomplish the identified priorities within the adjusted budget. In early 2020 a Capital Campaign Team will be formed and exciting plans will be introduced to the congregation.

STEWARDSHIP

The stewardship committee continued the emphasis of year-round stewardship messages that centered on what the Bible teaches about stewardship.

Messages in the St. John's News changed seasonally: winter months focused on worship; spring months focused on Scripture; summer months on service, and fall months on finances.

The theme of the fall pledge campaign for 2020 was titled God's Story, Our Story— Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow. A stewardship message was included in the St. John's News relating to the weekly Narrative Lectionary scripture verses. A new addition to our pledge cards was the opportunity to steward our gifts through worship, prayer, learning, and service in 2020. More than half of the pledge cards included member commitments



to worship as regularly as able and pray for the church family, pastors, and staff. Many also included commitments to new learning and service opportunities.

St. John's transitioned online giving processing from Vanco to Shelby Giving in October. More than 130 members give through recurring online gifts and many others use the convenience of auto-pay or credit cards. Members may notice a difference in the online form and additional communication from St. John's. This transition allows the church to better communicate directly with our members and express our gratitude for your generosity in a timely manner.

The Stewardship Team partnered with the Endowment Committee to offer educational opportunities as part of our financial stewardship ministry curriculum. We hosted a Financial Peace University class for members and the community in the spring and in the fall we offered a series of classes on Your Legacy. In 2020 we will pilot a new program provided by Thrivent and again offer Financial Peace University for the community.

FINANCE

The finance committee oversees the financial affairs of the congregation to ensure they are being conducted effectively and in accordance with financial best practices.

In 2019 the Finance Committee reviewed and approved the monthly financial statements, reviewed our insurance coverage, monitored the financial impact of the water damage in Noah's Ark classrooms, recommended additional benevolence of \$5,000 to the Central/Southern Illinois Synod and a 4.5% (\$80,000) distribution from the St. John's Endowment Fund to the operating fund, and approved the 2020 budget draft for submission to the Council

and Congregation. Due to positive financial results in the final quarter, the Endowment Fund distribution of \$20,000 was not needed.

As part of our transition to Shelby Next membership database, the church also transitioned our financial data to Shelby Financials and our online giving to Shelby Giving. In 2019, giving was 4%, and expenditures 3%, above budget and very comparable to 2018. We had unbudgeted expenses related to the Noah's Ark water damage, the ONE worship service, and Vision 2020 pre-project expenditures that were approved in 2018 but incurred in 2019. Year-end financial statements are provided at the end of this report.


The property committee protects all congregational property, providing a safe environment for guests, and keeps updated Facility use guidelines and recommendations for long-range facility projects.

ST. JOHN'S ENDOWMENT FUND

The St. John's Endowment Fund is used to enhance the ministry and mission of St. John's by encouraging, receiving, and administering existing and future gifts designated to the Fund and undesignated bequests received by the Congregation.

The year-end financial results for the Endowment Fund are included in the financial statements at the end of this report. More than 95% of the approximate total of \$1.9 million is in an account managed by PNC Financial Advisors. The remaining assets include investment in the ELCA Fund A and a beneficiary interest in various member insurance policies.

Gifts were received in 2019 from the Kathryn Sanders and the Lynn and Jan Brown estates and two families indicated intent to include St. John's in their estate planning.

Distributions from the Endowment Fund to the Operating Fund are recommended annually by the Finance committee based on financial results, reserves, and requests. In 2019, \$60,000 was distributed to the Operating Fund to support our benevolence giving, leadership education,

and the Vision 2020 pre-project costs.

The Endowment Fund committee activities focused on thanking our legacy society members and providing educational opportunities for the congregation as part of our financial stewardship curriculum. In April, more than 40 people attended the Planning Life and Legacy Luncheon and heard from our panelists: Chris Ayers (Be smart AND generous with your money), Pastor Anne Christiansen (Pre-planning your funeral where to start, and Julie Hollidav (Downsizing-embrace it). During the fall, we partnered with the stewardship committee to offer a series of classes titled Your Legacy, facilitated by Chris Magnuson.



COLUMBARIUM

St. John's began offering a Columbarium Ministry in 1995 when a church addition was added for ministry space. First Presbyterian Church, located at 2000 East College Avenue in Normal, is offering a Columbarium Ministry next year. Other than a few niches in St. Matthew's Episcopal Church on Oakland Avenue, we are the only Church Columbarium in Bloomington/Normal. Many cemeteries include appropriate inurnments for cremation remains and have for years.

A report by the National Funeral Directors Association predicts 2019 cremation rates will be near 55% and body burial rates at 39%. By 2040, cremations are predicted to be near 80% with body burials under 16%. Following cremations, 42% of the remains go to the family, 32.5% get inurned at the cemetery, 16% get scattered, and 8.1% are inurned in a Columbarium. With non-burial cremation options increasing, families have more opportunities to create personalized experiences. [Source: Frazer Consultants/NFDA7

Our niche prices are \$800 (companion with two urns) and \$500 (single with one urn). Engraving costs can be prepaid or reimbursed at then current fees. A total of 123 niche faces have been sold, leaving 141 available for purchase. In 2019, four niche faces were sold and two inurnments took place.

We are pleased with the Memorial Garden appearance. As Vision 2020 develops, there is no expectation that it will impact this area. As a reminder, we have three pairs of interment rights to offer at East Lawn Memorial Gardens. If interested please contact

the church office for more information.
